20-year LPA employee retires

An employee who has spent more than 20 years serving the Lake Panorama Association retires the end of June. Randy Holl's first day on the job was Nov. 24, 1995, replacing Claire Kirtley of Yale as maintenance supervisor.

Later he spent a few years as operations assistant manager overseeing maintenance, the dam, Panorama West and the Lake Panorama Water department. In 2005, he moved into the office as senior administrative assistant. Since then, he has been in charge of building issues, the LPA website, the weekly Panorama Prompt e-newsletter, the quarterly Panorama Post newsletter, and the proverbial "other duties as assigned."

Holl says he gains the most satisfaction from work he's done to improve communications with LPA members. "Developing a revived quarterly newsletter, the Prompt e-bulletin and the LPA website has been important for the community," he says. "I remember some of the misunderstandings members used to bring to the annual meetings because they didn't know what was being done about certain issues, or they had heard the 'grapevine' version. It's amazing how many fewer angry people we get at those meetings now."

Holl graduated from Iowa State University with a degree in outdoor recreation resources, which was a park management curriculum in the forestry department.

He brought a wealth of varied experiences to the LPA. He was a crew supervisor for Heard Gardens in Des Moines. For eight years, he owned and operated a landscape and lawn care services business in Marshalltown. Prior to that, he farmed with family in Marshall County and

he swimming pool and spa on the south side of the Lake Panorama National conference center opened in mid-May for its second year, and has been busy ever since. The pool is a cooperative effort between the Clover Ridge Interval Owners Association and the Lake Panorama Association, with operations handled by Lake Panorama National.

The LPN pro shop staff manages the pool from a check-in window near the pool. Snacks and drinks are available for purchase, including chips, ice cream treats, candy bars, pop, Gatorade, bottled water and canned beer. Sunscreen and lip balm also can be purchased.

Food orders can be placed with The Links restaurant and picked up in takeout containers. No glass is permitted at the pool, but beverages in plastic glasses can be purchased in The Links.

The pool is five feet wider and 20 feet longer than the previous pool, and the surrounding concrete deck is more spacious. Both the pool and hot tub are heated,

with covers in place overnight. People who own weeks in the Clover Ridge Interval Owners Association, have traded weeks to stay at the resort, or are staying in the LPN Inn and Suites, have free access to the pool. They show their keys to gain access.

All other pool users must purchase an annual membership or pay a daily fee. For Lake Panorama Association members, a 2016 pool membership for a single is \$75 and



for a family is \$130. For the general public, a single membership is \$85 and a family membership is \$145.

Annual members are given permanent wristbands to wear when using the pool. Those purchasing just for the day will receive a paper wristband. Pool memberships can be purchased at the pool checkin window, the LPN front desk, or online at lakepanoramanational.

The daily rate is \$3 per person. Pool hours are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. daily. Private pool parties can be scheduled in two-hour increments at a cost of \$150. Call the LPN front desk at 641-7550-2080 for more details.

There is a new executive chefin Lake Panorama National's kitchen, but he's not new to the LPN. As a teenager, Andrew Labath worked four summers as part of the LPN grounds crew. "Even when this was just a summer gig, I liked the fun atmosphere at the LPN," Labath says. "This is a family, and I like the way people are treated."

Labath grew up in Panora, and graduated from Panorama Schools in 2004. His mother Liz teaches second grade at Panorama. His father Bill, who is an LPN golfing member, is an electrician and owns his own business. Labath, who turns 30 years old in July, says he's spent half of his life cooking for others. He started cooking as a 14-year-old in the kitchen at PJ's in Panora, where he worked until he graduated from high school. He moved to Cedar Rapids and entered the Kirkwood Community College culinary program, graduating

While in school, he gained experience working in a steakhouse, a Marriott hotel, and in the Cedar Rapids Kernels baseball stadium kitchen. After graduation, he moved to North Carolina to work in a small restaurant in a renovated house. Next up was four years in a full-service restaurant. He also catered some events on his own, including a few weddings.

Two more jobs allowed Labath to gain additional experience. He worked for Earth Fare, a chain of health food stores, where he says he learned a lot

about fresh foods, traveled and helped open new stores. He also worked in 2014 at The Masters for a company that prepared and served food on the grounds, as well as to people flying in and out on private jets.

Labath moved back to Iowa a year ago to work as the head chef at The Port on Lake Panorama's main basin. Moving with him was his girlfriend, Taylor Marcellino. The pair met in North Carolina, although she's a California native. Once back in Iowa, Labath proposed and the couple's wedding is June 25 at The Port.

When the LPN executive chef position opened, Labath says he decided to apply because he saw it as a way to advance in his culinary career. "Working at The Port was great, but it was more seasonal. At the LPN, I'll have a chance to push myself a little harder because it's busier. There is a good group of people working here to help me get better at every aspect of my job," he says.

Labath says he's lucky to be

joining a kitchen that already has two experienced employees. Richard Holbrook has been working in The Links kitchen for nine years, and TJ Gliem has been there two years. "They stepped up to fill in the gap before I was hired, and I really respect them for that," he says. "I'm lucky to have them here, and I look forward to working with them."

Labath also is impressed with the upgrades done in the LPN kitchen this spring. "The kitchen is fantastic. It's spacious, and offers a lot of prep area that is well organized. That helps us get the food out faster, and keeps the food as fresh as it can be,"

Some tweaks to The Links menu will come, Labath says, but for now his focus is on what patrons like on the current menu, and what else they'd like to see there. "I love talking to people and getting feedback," he says. "I know the flatbread pizzas are popular, as are the tenderloins and burgers. I'm not going to mess with what's working.'

Labath says he likes to try new things, and plans to offer a daily sandwich or other dish as a special item that isn't currently on the menu. Customer comments will help him decide which items should return as future daily specials, or perhaps be added to the regular menu. He's also offering a fresh soup daily.

New employee brings broad experience to LPA

Then the LPA needed to recruit a new employee to replace a 20-year employee, they didn't have to look far. Brad Halterman grew up in Guthrie Center, graduated from high school there, and has been working the past 13 years as natural resources manager for the Guthrie County Conservation Board.

Halterman started work for the LPA in mid-May, replacing Randy Holl, LPA senior administrative assistant, who is retiring the end of June. Holl's job title is retiring with him, as Halterman's title is project manager. His responsibilities include communications, managing the LPA farmland, overseeing the LPA-managed Rural Improvement Zone (RIZ) conservation projects, and other miscellaneous duties.

Although Guthrie County is home to Halterman, he spent many years studying and working in other parts of Iowa. He earned a four-year bachelor's degree in mass communications from Grandview College in Des Moines. As he was wrapping that up, he decided to add a second bachelor's degree in conservation and wildlife management. He did that by attending Upper Iowa University in Fayette for one year.

It was during that year he met his future wife Brenda, who grew up in Stuart. Over Christmas break, he had seven weeks off from school. His parents were living in Des Moines at that time, so he went to the Walmart there to apply for a job. Brenda was the personnel manager who hired him to work during the Christmas rush.

When he returned to Fayette, he learned the lumberyard he had been working at part-time had closed, so he called to ask if he could continue working weekends. Brenda agreed so he drove back and forth between Fayette and Des Moines each week that spring. The couple married July 15, 1995.

Immediately after graduating from Upper Iowa, Halterman was hired by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources to work at Lake Rathbun. Yet he wanted to work in county conservation. So after nine months he took at job in the Des Moines County Conservation office, and he and Brenda moved to Bur-

The couple wanted to be closer to home, so when a job was advertised in the Greene County Conservation office, Halterman interviewed and was hired. That moved them to Jefferson for two years.

Halterman says his goal was always to be a county conservation director, so when the Jones County director position opened, he was hired, and the couple moved to Anamosa. They were there for six years before the opportunity to come back home.

By then they had two kids, and wanted to be closer to family. So when the position of natural resources manager in the Guthrie County Conservation office opened, Halterman applied and was hired.

For the past 13 years, the family has lived at the Nation's Bridge county park between Panora and Stuart. "That meant I was involved in a lot of things. I was the park ranger, naturalist and educator," Halterman says. "Guthrie County Conservation owns 1,100 acres of parks, wildlife areas, campgrounds and river accesses and I was responsible for all of that, as well as the county roadside program."

Halterman says he didn't

last two, were preparing him to work for the LPA. "I gained a lot of experience with budgets, rules and regulations, safety, natural resources and working with the public. All of that has made it possible for me to transition nicely to this new opportunity," he says.

Halterman says the new job has allowed him and Brenda to do something they've long wanted to do — buy their own home. "We lived at Nation's Bridge for 13 years, and prior to that we lived in the Jones County park residence. Living in a park is a great place to raise kids, but the downside is you're always at work, even when you aren't," he says.

The family now lives in Panora. Brenda works at West Des Moines Dental as a dental assistant and office manager. Bryce will be a senior and Brooke a sophomore when they return to classes at Panorama this fall.

Growing up in Guthrie County, Halterman is no stranger to Lake Panorama. He says he had friends who lived at the lake. "I always liked the community aspect, and when I saw the job announcement, I thought it would be a nice fit for me and my family," he says. "I spent 22 years in the conservation field, and was happy with my job with Guthrie County Conservation. But this is new and different,

and a refreshing change.' Of his new responsibilities, Halterman calls the communications aspect "huge. The weekly Prompt and quarterly Panorama Post that Randy established are very important. I look forward to continuing to provide these and other communications pieces that will keep LPA members informed."

He's also looking forward to managing LPA farmland, and coordinating with government agencies and RIZ on two wetlands projects that will help keep silt and nutrients out of the lake. He'll also take the lead on other projects that come along, and be charged with "developing new ideas to enhance what Lake Panorama already has, or take old ideas and make them new," he says.

Halterman says while he was familiar with Lake Panorama, he faces a big learning curve. "The nice thing is besides learning about my direct responsibilities, I've been spending a couple of days each week with different departments. I got to go onto the dredge and learn how it works, and I helped haul logs out of the lake. I've worked with the water department installing meters, and learned about the operation of the dam and water plant. I've mowed and I'm spending time with security and lake patrol," he says.

"Coming from the outside, I knew a lot goes on at Lake Panorama, but I really didn't have a clue about how much gets done every day," Halterman says. "The amount of work that is accomplished by the LPA staff is absolutely amazing. I look forward to working with each of the departments and office staff to help keep Lake Panorama a premiere location for LPA members."

2015 LPA FACTS AND STATS

Highlights of 2015 were included in the booklet distributed at the Lake Panorama Association's annual meeting May 14. Some of those are shared here for LPA members who are interested in numbers.

New home permits accounted for 13 of the 61 building permits issued in 2015. Only seven new permits were issued in 2014, not counting the tornado replacements. 2015 saw the highest number of home permits issued since 2006. Other permits issued last year included 13 storage sheds, three permanent docks, 23 home or garage additions, six detached garages, one boathouse repair, one gazebo, two home demolitions and one fence.

A total of 48 land disturbing permits were issued. These permits are required for projects disturbing more than 1,000 square feet of ground or projects within 100 feet of the lake. Many were for multiple purposes and 19 were for shoreline repair work or beach

The Lake Panorama Water Company produced 70,970,000 gallons of drinking water in 2015.

The Security department made 1,344 winter house checks, inspected 114 vessels for invasive species regulations, had 404 land enforcement issues, noted 132 security issues, had 138 boat enforcement stops, did 325 assists for other LPA departments, assisted other agencies 34 times, and reported 3,139 total events.

Security also responded to 56 alarms, asked 30 people to leave the lake, serviced the campgrounds 28 times on request, checked 128 deer during the deer hunt, had 69 Iowa DNR-related events, responded to 23 noise complaints, dealt with 38 parking issues, took down 30 illegal signs, investigated six prowler calls, noted 27 stop sign and six speeding violations, noted 18 swimming violations, investigated five nonfelony thefts, checked on

eight people to see if they were okay, and noted 11 golf cart violations. In 10 years, Security has reduced daily mileage driven by 24 percent while increasing the number of events noted by almost 50 percent.

Chip seal was applied to eight miles of LPA streets in 2015, compared to the 9.45 miles planned for 2016.

The LPA received \$38,688.10 in farm income in 2015. Of that, \$14,207 was for ground in the Conservation Reserve Program, with the rest from hay ground rental and a 47-acre row crop area.

The LPA registered 2,236 vessels in 2015, which was an 8 percent increase over 2014. Of those, 1,218 boats were 10 horsepower and up, 396 were personal water craft — an increase of 63 over 2014 — and 622 were under 10 horsepower — an increase of 79 over 2014. In the last 10 years, the total number of boats registered with the LPA increased by 536.

SUMMERTIME ANI 'HE LIVIN' IS "BUS

There is little doubt the busiest time for Lake Panorama property owners is the time between Memorial Day and Labor Day. There is plenty of yard work and home improvement projects to tackle, but also lots of golf to be played, boating to be done,

and good times with family and

friends to plan. Summer also is the busiest time for the Lake Panorama Association staff, as they not only deal with more members and guests on the roads and water, but also routine maintenance and construction projects. In this month's Q&A, John Rutledge, LPA general manager, talks about some summer projects and priorities.

Q: What's new at the LPA for

A: 2016 promises to be an exciting year for the Lake Panorama Association. As usual, LPA will invest a substantial portion of its annual budget in recurring infrastructure maintenance, such as road seal-coating and water system improvements. These are the "meat and potatoes" of LPA's spring and summer worklist and are always provided for in our annual budget.

In addition to the routine items, we are looking forward to some new projects and purchases this year. LPA is pleased to be coordinating

with Friends of Lake Panorama for the installation of a new playground at Sunset Beach. The community surrounding Sunset Beach will tell you this is one of the most overlooked gems at Lake Panorama. Our hope is the new playground will give families an opportunity to get off of the lake for a few hours and enjoy some quality recreational time with their kids and grandkids. Thanks to everyone who volunteered and donated to make this happen. The equipment has been ordered and if all goes as planned, the playground should be completed before the end of July.

A related item is LPA's purchase of a beach groomer. We hosted demonstrations of beach groomers from two industry-leading vendors and are pleased one is an excellent fit for us. Rocks, sticks and goose droppings all were managed effectively by the tractor-towed groomer. Purchase of the groomer was confirmed at the LPA's board of directors meeting in May. Cleaner and healthier beaches are in the immediate future for LPA members.

Q: What is the status of lake dredging for 2016?

A: The Lake Panorama Rural Improvement Zone (RIZ) and LPA recently hosted representatives of DSC Dredge, the builder

of our dredge and booster station. Minor programming and hardware modifications were made to the system to fine-tune operations and increase productivity. Work is underway in the river channel above the debris trap, and it's expected the LPA crew will spend the bulk of the summer there removing sediment from the river channel. RIZ contracts with the LPA to conduct this annual dredging

As summer winds down, LPA will relocate the dredge to Log Cabin Cove and Boulder Cove for brief sediment removal projects. Both have been on the books for more than a year, because of the coordination needed to make these happen. Letters that outline specifics and timing will be sent in mid-June to members who will be impacted by these projects.

Q: What's the status of RIZ's storage basin and the CREP wetland projects?

A: The construction of the 1.3 million cubic yard Cory sediment basin west of the LPA maintenance shed is roughly two-thirds complete. This project involves excavating a large hole for storage, with the excavated material used to build a dam around the basin. An outlet structure will allow clear water back into the lake through a drainage into Hughes Cove.



This basin, which represents an investment by RIZ of nearly \$2 million, will be wrapped up in June and accommodate dredging of Boulder Cove in 2016 and Helen's Cove in 2017.

In addition, RIZ is cooperating with state and federal agencies on the development of two Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) wetlands immediately upstream from Lake Panorama. CREP is a voluntary water quality program available to 37 Iowa counties, including Guthrie County. The goal of CREP is to reduce nitrate and sediment loads to surface waters by installing wetlands in targeted areas. Other benefits are increases in wildlife habitat and recreational opportunities. A 26-acre wetland upstream from Helen's Cove will be built this summer or fall. A slightly smaller wetland serving Hughes Cove will follow in late-2016 or 2017.

Q: What are LPA's expectations for debris management this year?

A: I started working for LPA in 2007. In my first week, Lake Panorama experienced a major debris event. My summer training involved a significant amount of time

participating in an "all hands on deck" approach to debris removal. Old pontoon boats, garden tools, ropes and sore backs were the strategy for cleaning up the lake. The process was slow, and a bulk of the summer was tainted with debris in the lake.

In 2009, LPA made a major investment in debris management. A true debris barrier was purchased/ constructed and deployed. In addition, LPA shared half the expense of the RIZ utility barge to help with log removal. It's hard to believe this, but our "new" barge and "new" debris trap are beginning their eighth season of service on Lake Panorama.

I can recall only three instances in which the debris barrier was overwhelmed. All three events represented epic flows in the Middle Raccoon River. Clean up in those instances was manageable, as a bulk of the material went over the dam.

Members can continue to expect 95 percent of the rain events to be contained by our debris trap. And if we get an epic flow, members can trust we're much better equipped and staffed to remove floating hazards in a timely fashion.

Q: Any other thoughts for the kickoff of summer?

A: The improved economy has brought with it a large number of new members. Please make a point to walk down the street and welcome newcomers to your neighborhood. They'll greatly appreciate having a neighbor from whom they can gather tips and advice regarding lake life. Share a barbecue or a cocktail and get to know each other. You'll be glad you reached out and made the connection. Who knows, you may need help moving a couch out of your basement before summer is over!

Use of fireworks without permit can result in LPA nuisance fine

The summer months at Lake Panorama bring many fun and exciting times for LPA members, families and guests. Outdoor activities are numerous with only the unpredictable Iowa weather guiding those activities. Planned and scheduled events abound both at Lake Panorama and throughout Guthrie and surrounding counties.

As we get closer to the Fourth of July holiday, the use of fireworks becomes more prevalent. Although it has been debated legislatively at the state level for the past couple of years, Iowa's Law (Code 727.2) still considers the use of fireworks a simple misdemeanor, except for snakes and sparklers.

The use of fireworks was reviewed by the LPA board at its May 24 meeting. Fireworks proved to be a challenging discussion as the board wants everyone to enjoy themselves, but the board also has as its top priority the safety of the LPA community, its members, families, guests and property.

The LPA board determined fireworks can and will be considered a nuisance under LPA rules, if the usage causes complaints by other LPA members. A nuisance violation can carry a monetary fine. Some members expect their neighbors might use fireworks on the night of the LPA-sanctioned Independence Day show, but the use of fireworks for multiple nights on the holiday

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
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
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LAKE PANORAMA SAFE BOATING IS NO ACCIDENT

ince Lake Panorama is actually a reservoir on the Middle Raccoon River, much of the lake is made up of a relatively narrow river valley. This means safe boating, especially on holidays and weekends, requires close observation and care. And it means boat operators and passengers need to follow boating rules and practice safe behavior to avoid accidents.

Lake Patrol is authorized to stop anyone operating recklessly or violating Iowa or LPA boating regulations. They can issue either a warning or a citation that will go against the vessel owner's membership. Also, Iowa DNR law enforcement often patrols the lake during holiday weekends and can legally stop any vessel for violations or breath tests.

KNOW THE ROPES

All of Lake Panorama except the main basin, which is the open expanse near Highway 4, is intended for counterclockwise traffic. Centerline buoys mark the approximate center of the channel and boat traffic should move up and down the lake on the "right" side of the centerline buoys. Boat operators who want to cut across traffic to a cove or dock on the opposite side of the lake need to first check for traffic from behind and from the opposite direction.

Shallow areas are marked with warning buoys that indicate dangerous shallows, rocks or rock beds. Although a few of these markers are for specific, individual rocks, most indicate an area of shallows that could shear a propeller or lower unit. Steer clear of all warning buoys.

All coves on Lake Panorama have marker buoys that show the speed limit. Usually the entrance to a cove has a 10 mph speed limit and further into the cove there will be a "no wake" buoy. Smaller coves go immediately to no wake, which means travel slowly enough that only ripples

or less are the result. If vessels are traveling more than 10 mph, a 200-foot interval between other vessels should be observed. No vessel should

exceed 10 mph if traveling within 50 feet of the shoreline, a dock, downed skiers or parked vessels.

All vessels have a maximum number of people allowed. Size or weight doesn't matter. Everyone on board, plus those being towed, counts towards the vessel capacity. Vessels carrying more people than the stated maximum will be ticketed.

A personal flotation device (PFD) in good condition and rated for the size and weight of every passenger in the vessel must be available. All passengers under 13 years of age must wear a PFD when the vessel is moving.

Lighting is required for all vessels beginning one-half hour after sunset through sunrise. During this time period, the speed limit on Lake Panorama is 10 mph.

All operators of any powered vessel at Lake Panorama must be at least 16 years of age and, if under 18, must have passed and have in their possession a boating safety certificate recognized by the Iowa DNR.

PERSONAL WATER CRAFT

LPA rules for personal water craft (PWC) are more restrictive than Iowa boating laws. LPA rules do not permit anyone under 16 to operate a PWC, even if a responsible adult is on board.

PWCs are not to be on the water beginning one-half hour after sundown until sunrise. A reminder that when using a PWC to tow someone, the skier or tuber counts as a passenger when it comes to vessel capacity. A PWC rated for two people towing, with two on board and one being towed, is over capacity and will be cited for a safety violation. Reckless

operation of PWC also will be lowed from one-half hour after cited by Lake Patrol.

TOWING RULES

Iowa law requires there must be an observer in the vessel nine years of age or older in addition to the operator when towing or allowing wakesurfing.

The LPA has some additional towing rules:

- The Narrows area above Sunset Beach has limits on when towing and/or wakesurfing can be done. These activities are not allowed between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend. The Security supervisor also may declare other times "no towing" if dangerous crowding is possible.
- No towing should come within 100 feet of shore.
- No more than two tubes or inflatable objects can be towed by one vessel.
- No towing is allowed in the Marina area.
- No skiing or towing is al-

sunset until sunrise.

NON-POWERED CRAFT

Canoes, paddleboats, kayaks and sailboats must consider boat traffic conditions when operating. During busy times, coves are the best place to be. If on the main lake, these vessels must obey the counter-clockwise traffic pattern. Lights are required at night. These vessels also must have boat stickers, invasive species stickers and be inspected prior to launch if they have been elsewhere.

INVASIVE SPECIES

Almost every vessel operating on Lake Panorama must be registered with the Iowa DNR. Exceptions are kayaks and canoes 13 feet or less. Yet all vessels must have an LPA boating permit, either a member permit or a guest permit. In addition, rules specifically designed to keep invasive species out of Lake Panorama are in place.

Each member vessel that only

boats on Lake Panorama is given a green invasive species sticker to go with their boat permit. Every member vessel that goes to other water bodies is declared a NON-RESIDENT vessel and must report to Lake Security at 641-755-3101 prior to every launch. Any vessel is subject to inspection at any time.

State law requires plugs be out while boats are transported. A boat should be cleaned, drained of all liquids (bilge, live wells, bait buckets, compartments, etc.) and completely dried, including ski ropes, anchor ropes, etc. Fishermen are encouraged to carry a sponge for removing all water from live wells. Lake Security may keep a vessel from being launched if there is water in any part of the vessel or if there is evidence of organic material, even just mud, on the vessel or trailer.



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












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also spent five years as executive officer of the Montgomery and Marion County Conservation Boards.

Those experiences made him a good fit for Lake Panorama. "I've enjoyed being a part of many improvements around the development," Holl says. "The Enterprize debris boat, the debris boom, traffic signs, tree plantings, Shady Beach improvements, and improvements in the maintenance department all have been important."

But there have been challenges. "When I first started, there was a lack of decent equipment and equipment storage, and an attitude by some that we ought to be able to do lots of work with the same dollars we had been using years before," Holl says. "That was prior to the LPA board being able to raise assessments a small percentage as costs and inflation ate into our budgets."

Holl says the Vision 2000 committees in 1999 recognized the importance of allowing the LPA board the power to increase assessments. "At that time, it took a member vote to approve any increase in assessments. This severely hampered board actions and resulted in a lot of property owned by the LPA being sold to fund maintenance of the development," he says. "Fortunately, the board took that to the membership, which approved up to a 5 percent increase each year without a membership vote. This has made a tremendous difference in the LPA's ability to meet maintenance needs and emergencies, and still make some improvements on a regular basis."

Holl describes the LPA as "a unique animal. It is a community, a business and a government all wrapped up into one. It has most of the same issues a city has, with less legal means to deal with them. It has to remain a viable business by keeping things updated, obtaining the necessary funding to do so, and to do it in a way that makes it a place people want to live, as well play"

Looking to Lake Panorama's future, Holl says it depends on

how much people think about it. "I know members have considerable investments in property, homes, boats and the expenses that go along with those things. But that's why it's all the more important to spend money toward maintaining and improving what's here to insure the value people have already invested," he says.

"Tastes change and recreational preferences change," he continues. "But keeping the lake and surroundings beautiful and adding new, unique opportunities that complement what is already here will help keep this community a great place for others to purchase and enjoy. Tie-ins to the beautiful Middle Raccoon River Valley and local communities will likely pay off."

Holl and his wife Linda have been married 22 years, and are both retiring June 30. "Between us we have kids in four states. Three kids are married and have families totaling eight grandkids, so far," he says. "The grandkids range in age from 2 to 13. We have grandkids from three countries ... two adopted from Ethiopia, two from Colombia and four born in the Republic of Texas. Well, the Texans seem to think it's a separate country, anyway."

Holl says the couple likely will move within the year from their home in Perry to be near at least one of their kids. And they will travel. "We are looking forward to a retirement celebration trip to Rome, the Italian Riviera and the 'Sound of Music' area of Austria and southern Germany," he says. "We've been fortunate to travel to where our adopted grandsons are from and may return to those countries some day for heritage trips."

Holl says they will spend more time seeing family and doing volunteer work and taking mission trips. "We love to walk and day hike, so we hope to work that in with our other activities. I now volunteer at Door of Faith in Des Moines and hope to find similar opportunities in a new location with local ministries or churches," he says.

Reflecting on his time at the LPA, Holl says the main thing he enjoyed was working for and with some great people. "Driving around the lake and having

Neighbors or others in the area might find fireworks disturbing and that can extend to family pets.

If a bottle rocket is set off into the sky, odds are it will land on someone else's property. Members should remember they are liable for damage caused by themselves, or their guests. Respect the investment your neighbors and fellow members have made in their property. If you use illegal fireworks, and it offends

your neighbors or other members, you will be required by LPA security to stop under the LPA's nuisance rules.

The mixing of illegal fireworks and alcohol makes for a heightened chance of damaging neighboring property and passing boats and is especially discouraged. The risk of personal injury to members, both bystanders and self, is significantly increased also.

The LPA hosts two fireworks shows during the year. The Independence Day fireworks show, which will be held on Saturday, July 2, is coordinated by the Scheiring family and funded by LPA member donations. The Panorama Days fireworks show, which will be held on Friday, August 5, is co-sponsored by LPA and The Port. 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

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
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

Panorama Panthers Repeat as Class 2A Boys State Golf Champions

epeating shots is a golf trait that usually leads to low scores. Repeating rosters, at least at the high school **level, can work, too.** Panorama, led by players who were with them a year ago, successfully defended their Class 2-A boys state golf championship on May 28 at Lakeside Golf Course in Fort Dodge.

Panorama, who returned five of six golfers from last year's state squad, overcame a slim two-stroke deficit from the opening round by firing a 303 Saturday. The Panthers finished with a 604 total, with four of the team's golfers going below 80 Saturday.

"I'm really happy we could do it twice because that's something we really wanted to do," said junior George Appleseth, who was the team's top individual with a 145 (71-74). The first day, Appleseth birdied 16, 17 and 18 in an outstanding opening round in Fort Dodge.

Junior Will Babcock, who won the school's first-ever individual state golf title in first time.

Ames last year, finished tied 11th with a 153, and senior teammate Reid Cobb tied for 13th place with a 154.

Play started in rain Friday and ended in rain Saturday.

Other scores for Panorama, Max Monthei (19th) with a 156; Aaron Klinge (35th) with a 164; Adam Hackfort (52nd) with

Medalist Logan Schweinefus of South Winneshiek of Calmar shot a 3-under par 69 Saturday to go with his opening-round 70. He finished with a 139, two strokes ahead of Fort Dodge St. Edmond's Charlie Doyle.

Appleseth said repeating the state championship was harder than winning it the

"Last year after the first day we were up by 11 strokes (over fifth-ranked Kuemper Catholic) and this year we were down by two, so that was definitely different," he said. "We didn't want to go out second place, we wanted to win it."

Panorama head coach Hal Rossow said even though his team trailed at the conclusion of the first day, they felt pretty

"In fact, the players were much more relaxed than I was," he joked. "When you're down by two shots it isn't much, because you can make that up on one or two holes. They had a bunch of confidence. Today we were able to go out with the attitude that we needed to make up those shots."

Panorama was paired with first-day leader Clear Lake on Saturday and five of six Panthers beat the Clear Lake golfer.

'We were the most consistent team," Rossow said. There were three strokes difference between the two days and four Panthers shot in the 70s.

"I think it was that we've played tough courses all year and we just really pulled together as a team and made that second day a strong showing," Appleseth said.

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

Agenda Item 4a - LPN, LLC Board of Managers Report. Brice Oakley spoke regarding the LPN, LLC Board of Managers highlighting the following areas:

Agenda Item 4b - Variance request by Haviland, Lot 919. **Excerpt from Building Codes** committee meeting:

David and Twila Haviland, lot 919, Plat 22, 4203 Clover Drive and son Chris Haviland, representing them, returned from the March meeting with a revised variance request from the original. Chris presented a site plan by Snyder & Associates that moved the proposed detached garage back 29.41 feet from the cul-desac circle and 11 feet from the side lot line at the front corner. The proposal includes no roof overhang on the street side of the garage and reducing the depth of the proposal to 30 feet instead Of 32 feet. This proposal leaves 8 feet from the building to the home's deck and is parallel to and lined up with the home. Chris explained they wanted to have it come out with the eight foot gap so as to leave room for the planter and an area to transport his handicapped brother around the home to go to the lakeshore side of the house. He explained the north side of the home was too steep for a wheelchair. To get the eight feet and also get close to being 30 feet from the cul-de-sac as requested by the neighboring property owners at the last meeting, the size of the garage was reduced. Tometich remarked that this arrangement concurred with his recommendations at the March meeting. The committee felt the adjustment to fit with their discussion as well and determined the change acceptable. The variance is within similar variances for other lots on this street and creates a balanced appearance, and improved situation compared to the existing circumstances. Moved by Coghlan, seconded by Evans, to recommend the LPA Board give a 5.6 foot front lot setback variance resulting in the garage being set back 29.4 feet from the cul-de-sac. Equipment Specifications and limitations

Add (j) Over-length and/or Over-horsepower Vessels

The LPA Board of Directors may on a case-by-case basis, provide written variances for vessel size and/or horsepower limit to vessels that serve the LPA membership. Variances shall be at the sole discretion of the LPA Board of Directors and shall be accompanied by a Commercial General Liability policy of not less than \$1 million per single occurrence and \$2 million aggregate, with the Lake Panorama Association being listed as an additional insured.

An additional item is how to handle non-member vendors that do work on the lake with vessels that are not over limit. After discussion, it was determined staff will research options and ensure non-member vendors are functioning under existing rules for guest boats and invasive species compliance. If this is not achievable, then additional rules will be considered at a future meeting.

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
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Tori's Angels seeks to help 13 children

Thirteen children with lifethreatening medical conditions and their families are counting

That's because they are aided by donations to the Tori's Angels Foundation which pays for all expenses related to the condition and not covered by insurance. These include travel, lodging, meals, co-payments, deductibles and prescription medicine.

Bill Ridgley of Panora is CEO and tireless board chairman of the organization. He explains the financial need is crucial this year and is asking people to search their hearts.

"We have picked up five new children since the beginning of the year instead of the normal one or two, putting us at 13 children."

(The annual average cost per child is over \$7,000.) "That puts us at \$48,000 more than we've needed in the past," he said. "We are looking at all kinds of fundraising activities and really appreciate all the donations we

It's estimated about \$97,00 will be needed for the calendar year. Presently only \$24,000 has been generated, but fundraisers are scheduled.

No one suffering from a lifethreatening condition has ever been turned down by the foundation. Based on medical records, two physicians verify each applicant's condition.

The "Angels" in the foundation's name represents all the donors. "Tori" is Tori Heckman. A fundraiser for her at age 5 in July of 2010 led to the idea of a founda-

tion to help multiple children. Officially founded May 1, 2001 as a 501(c)(3) non-profit, it has aided 19 kids and their families. Five have passed away and one is free of illness and attending

It's the kids and their parents that keeps CEO Ridgley going. "The biggest thing that motivates me is helping the kids and seeing the smiles on their faces,"

"Also seeing the relief of the parents is huge, being freed from the financial stress.'

And he smiles, "Once in awhile a little guy or gal will give me a big hug and I'm good to go for two months."

He pointed out most premier heart surgeons are located on both coasts. "Hotel bills in big cities are not inexpensive," he emphasizes.

"Farmer Bill" as he refers to himself contributes by the freewill tilling of gardens (about 30 a year) and truck farming some 1-1/2 acres of ground to grow vegetables. These he will be selling at PJ's Drive-In in a stand next to Highway 44.

Ridgley stresses every cent earned through fundraisers goes to the Tori's Angles Foundation. Foundation expenses are paid by the board of directors.

Locally there will be a breakfast and silent auction at the Panora Community Center on July 17. ("We are looking for silent auction items.")

Then on August 27 a Family Fun Fair is on tap at Faith Bible Church grounds with inflatables, clowns, face painting, obstacle course, 3-legged and sack races and popcorn and ice cream stands.

All events are free-will offerings. Also the foundation mans the concession stand at local soccer matches and sells T-shirts.

Further, with kids over a wide area, usually a fundraiser is held in each community represented by a child.

Donations can be left at the Panora State and Guthrie Coun-

Ridgley and wife Connie, Dave and Mary Beidelman and Michael and Barb Bahde planned the original fundraiser for Tori Heckman, daughter of Travis and Joey Heckman. She needed open heart surgery in Boston and her parents had expended their funds, said Ridgley.

"It was wildly successful," he said, "We generated more than Tori needed." The Heckman family was then asked if they agreed to setting up a formal non-profit foundation and they did. Tori remains one of the children.

Ridgley said several prayer chains pray for the children and their families with both prayer needs and victories posted on Facebook.

As for the future, "We're letting the Lord lead us," said Ridgley, a certified lay speaker who fills in at 14 churches. "I think in the next two years we'll be serving

about 24 families or more." He gives strong appreciation to his board of directors and the Angel Council, which volunteers at events. "My wife Connie is involved in everything. She is the real star."

Ridgley retired from major corporation GROW MARK where he was Director of Research and New Development.





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


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Wild Rose bringing horse, dog TV racing to Jefferson

Wild Rose president and chief operating officer Tom Timmons Wednesday said the casino-andentertainment company's Jefferson location plans to introduce simulcast dog and horse race wagering as soon as the fall, possibly in time for the early November Breeders Cup.

"We might be able to pull that off," said Timmons, who is act-

ing as interim general manager at Wild Rose Jefferson

Timmons confirmed plans to have the TV screens and remote betting systems in place for racing by 2017.

"That's probably more realistic," he said.

The simulcasting will be installed in the Coaches Corner restaurant.

There will be no actual horse or dog track at Jefferson. Rather, Wild Rose Jefferson patrons will be able to gamble daily on horse and dog racing from around the nation through an arrangement with the Iowa Greyhound Association, which operates a track — The Iowa Greyhound Park — and provides live televised rac-

Meanwhile, Wild Rose Jefferson in April posted its best month of gambling revenue since opening July 13, according to filings with the Iowa Racing and Gam-

ing in Dubuque.

ing Commission.

The casino reported revenues of \$2.726 million on admissions of

41,710.

"I'd take a lot more (months) like it," Timmons said.

Timmons assumed expanded duties as the general manager of Wild Rose Jefferson March 21 following the departure of Mike

Timmons said a "perfect storm" of factors boosted the casino revenue in April. There were five weekends in April, many people received tax returns and weather allowed gamblers to travel with ease, but wasn't nice enough for major outdoor activity to compete with the casino, Timmons said.

Some solid promotions and internal improvements also factored into the mix, and other casinos across Iowa — including Wild Rose's operations in Emmetsburg and Clinton — had strong Aprils, too, Timmons said.

Timmons said he expects to have an announcement on a permanent general manager

for Wild Rose within weeks.

The racing commission filings also reveal that Wild Rose Jefferson had the second-best slot machine odds of Iowa's 19 state-regulated casinos for the three-month period running from February to April. Wild Rose paid out 91.7 percent of the money poured into slot machines, trailing only Prairie Meadows Racetrack & Casino in Altoona, which posted a payout of 91.9 percent.

In April patrons wagered \$29 million on slot machines in Jefferson.

The simulcasting plan would mean that in addition to betting day-to-day tracks from Florida to California, Wild Rose patrons sitting in Jefferson could possibly watch and bet on the Kentucky Derby, Preakness, Breeders Cup and other top races.


Casinos in Iowa that don't already simulcast races (which includes all facilities except Prai-

rie Meadows Racetrack & Casino in Altoona and Horseshoe in Council Bluffs) are, under 2014 state legislation, allowed to ink deals with the Iowa Greyhound Association, which has a lease to run live dog races at a Dubuque track and simulcast horse and dog races from around the nation, state regulators say. The simulcasting rights for the Iowa Greyhound Association emerged with a deal that allowed Horseshoe in Council Bluffs and Mystique in Dubuque to jettison live dog racing.

Timmons, a former top Prairie Meadows executive, has served as a consultant to the Iowa Greyhound Association, and is familiar with the racing industry and the rules associated with the simulcasting opportunities.

The Iowa Racing and Gaming Commission will hold its June meeting at Wild Rose Jefferson. The meeting is at 8:30 a.m. June 9.





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
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
